




#### **Number of Visits Completed**




### Language Spoken In the Home










### Mammoth English Survey Averages






### Mammoth Spanish Survey Averages










What were the strong points of the playgroups?






### Parent Child Workshop Language & Ethnicity




# Changes in self-assessed parenting skills before and after Little Feet










### Transition to School Activities

Partners: Mammoth and Eastern Sierra Unified School Districts

- Round Up
  - **Target:** All families with incoming Kindergartners
  - Purpose:
    - Meet the kindergarten teacher(s) and the principal
    - Get to know the elementary school sites
    - Receive oral health checks (Mammoth only)
    - Get registration packets and kindergarten survival kits (backpacks with school readiness supplies)
- Pre-Kindergarten Assessment
  - Target: All incoming kindergartners
  - Purpose: Assess school readiness to help determine eligibility for Summer Bridge priority to children assessed as not kindergarten ready.
- Summer Bridge
  - **Target:** Children assessed as not kindergarten ready, and, as space provides, other incoming kindergartners
  - **Purpose:** Provide a 2 week, half-day program (in English and Spanish in Mammoth) with a certified teacher to help all children be ready for school on the first day of kindergarten.




Kindergarten Round Up FY 2011-12





Kindergarten Assessments FY 2011-12







- Yes. Absolutely. I have enjoyed talking with Mrs. Hartman and Mrs. Stoiber and have grown comfortable in that classroom and with the campus. I am so very glad to have had the opportunity for [my child] to participate.
- I feel that [my child] starting kindergarten will be easier and she will transition better. This makes me feel more relaxed.
- It is nice to be able to get comfortable with the routine and campus before school is in session.
- My son is autistic and non-verbal, and this program has really helped me to communicate strengths, weaknesses, etc. with the teacher before she has a full class.



Has RAR increased the amount of time you read to your child?



- Partners: Childcare centers and homes, Raising a Reader (library story hours), Trish Schlicting & Altrusa (Readers' Theatre), Drs. Fujimoto, Schrager, Carkeet, and Bishop




- Target: Child care providers who work in an early learning program for pay in a licensed facility or a facility that is legally exempt from licensure under the following circumstances:
  - Minimum of 9 months during the program year and working a minimum of 15 hours per week.
  - Worked with children ages birth to five in a California-based licensed or licensed-exempt FCC home, state preschool, Head Start, or child care center for at least nine months during the past year.
- Purpose: Promote high-quality child care in Mono County by building a skilled and stable child care workforce:
  - Provide incentives to quality early child care providers who complete training and education and remain in the field.
  - Address the First 5 Mono County Commission's goal to improve child development and the community's need to retain child care providers.



#### 1. Family Education

- % of parents and other family members improving in knowledge about child development.
  - 124 families, 18% of Mono County children (164 children) birth to 5 were enrolled in programs with a child-development education component
    - 24% of those children and their parent(s) participated in programs with a knowledge-improvement assessment (N=40).
    - Of those 24% of children, 60% of their parents (N=24) completed an assessment.
    - Of the parents assessed, 63% (N=15) reported an increase in knowledge about child development.
